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Our Theme for the Year: No Bullying

In the midst of cheers, music and a booming local radio personality, Randolph Middle School kicked off a serious, year-long focus on bullying at the "Do The Right Thing" Rally Aug. 29. The rally featured CJ of Radio Station WIBT, Charlotte Beat 96.1, who talked about his own experiences.

Throughout the school year, RMS will hold 6th grade discussion groups, teacher trainings and other school-wide events. The Randolph PTSA will sponsor a parent information forum at 6 p.m. Thursday, Sept. 15, during the PTSA general meeting. The bullying forum will precede Randolph's Back-To-School activities and will include a Slice & Scoop Dinner with pizza, ice cream and drinks for sale.

These activities are aimed at helping the Randolph Family — students, staff and parents – become aware how common bullying is, learn to recognize bullying behavior and develop action plans, said Principal Jackie Menser.

"In most cases, we don't find out about it until it has gone on for some time," said Principal Menser. "Most students don't realize that bullying happens everywhere and there's no shame." A recent Reader's Digest poll found that 70% of parents surveyed said their child had been bullied at school.

The key, said Principal Menser, is for someone — the student being bullied or another student — to tell the right people.

Although society has historically considered bullying a "rite of passage" for adolescents, attitudes are starting to change as more people recognize the psychological and physical damage that bullying can inflict on victims. Experts agree that bullying tends to manifest itself in different ways for females and males. For example, males are more likely to exhibit physical aggression or intimidation, while females are more likely to engage in name-calling or gossip.

One of the most important things any school can do is make it clear that bullying will not be tolerated and encourage students to report incidents as soon as possible. International Baccalaureate Report

As summer turns to fall, another academic year beckons students and teachers to explore the many facets of the International Baccalaureate Program at Randolph.

The first newsletter of the year is a perfect opportunity to review the philosophies and progress of the International Baccalaureate program over the past four years. By focusing on a few key questions one will be able to better understand both the program and its development at Randolph.

First, what is the International Baccalaureate (IB) program and how does it affect our school? The IB program is designed to develop academic and individual skills while increasing cultural appreciation for the world around us. Through the eight subject areas, students set goals, experience a wide variety of teaching approaches, support the community through volunteer activities and develop a personal portfolio. Students that finish the program in high school would be eligible to receive an IB diploma.

Second, what is the background of the IB program at Randolph? Four years ago, the IB program was moved from Marie G. Davis to Randolph. Former Sedgefield Principal Jackie Menser used her expertise to set Randolph's new program in motion. Staff training, schedule adjustments and community meetings created the foundation for our current program.

What is the program's progress to date? Randolph's IB program is in its fourth year of implementation. Year one was used to educate the staff, students and community about the program and its philosophies. Year two focused on training and the development of lessons and practices that reflect IB strategies. That same year, Application Part A was submitted and accepted, which allowed Randolph to become an IB candidate school. Year three saw the continued growth of the program and the completion of Application Part B along with a visit from IB mentor Sharon Pope. This summer, Randolph and Myers Park High School were notified that in October, they will host an IB authorization team visit. The team will determine if our program should be authorized by the International Baccalaureate Organization.

As we enter this final phase of the authorization process, we will celebrate our progress as an IB school and the many opportunities it has offered our students, staff and community.
